Edwin Bache on his card said as follows
about 4:30 P.M. on Friday the 7th day of
February 1881 I went to the Creek with my
Brother now deceased, we went to get some
hopping sticks when the deceased got his
the who near the Creek and the stick slipped
in, he screamed and went into the
Creek, he got the stick and threw it out.
The deceased then said I will have
a little swim, he tried to get on a log
and slipped back into the Creek, I saw he
was under the water and I jumped in
when I jumped in with my clothes on
I was under the water. I then swam to the
bank and got out. I am Benjamin
Lobley butted hands and tried to reach him
we could not reach him, and we ran
home. My Mother and William then came
down to the Creek. William saw, and William
Native son went into the Creek and dived
for him I was sent home before they
body was recovered.

By Mr. Lobley My Brother the deceased was 10 years
I am 13 years, I can swear a Little
the deceased even did not drown.

I was with Edwin Backe and his deceased

we got the stalks the deceased walked
some Backe sick slipped into the water
he stripped and went in after it. he
got it and threw it out. he then said
I will have a little swim, he tried to go
in a slippery log he slipped back into deep
water he went under water and came up
brother Edwin Backe jumped in with

him clothes on. he could not get to him.
We then beat him hands but could not reach
him we then came home. the deceased
could not swim. I am ten years of age.

William Lamb on his visit said as follows. I am a highly qualified medical practitioner and Assistant Superintendent at Morgans Asylum. I examined the deceased Walter James Radde on Friday the forth instant about 6 A.M. in the evening. I was at the Res. R. S. Jones house. She shortly quit home and wished a boy wanted the loan of a doctor's prop as there was a boy in the Res. Dr. Jones and I at once proceeded to the bank of the Creek where we saw several men endeavoring to recover the body. After about 1/2 an hour Hander Waters succeeded in bringing the body to the surface. When I took charge life was extinct. I did not use any means connected with the body as I consider the case quite hopeless. I have examined the body since death and I believe the cause of death to be asphyxia from drowning.

William Waters being sworn said
as follows. I am a trawler at
Groton's wharf, on Friday 7th February
at 10 past 5th in the afternoon I
was sitting on my Verandah. I saw
some people at the mouth of River &
went there to see what was up. When
I got there I found that Mr. Baché's
body was on the creek. I took off my
boots and went into the creek. I
dived for him several times, and
could not find him. I got a stick
and felt about the bottom at last
I thought I felt something. I then
dived down and brought up
the body of the deceased. When
James Baché his wife was estate from
the time I got there the deceased
was in the water for over an hour
before I found him. When
the body was found there was about
ten feet of water.

William saw a body cast ashore as follows
Seen a blacksmith working at Gorana
I know the deceased to be Walt-Lewis
Beach on Saturday 7th of February 1881

We were about the river bank and looked along the river
I went to the coast. I was shown where he
was found went into the coast I saw David
Sutherland fisherman for a cord of rope with
a hook at the end of it in the mean time
I took off my boots and waded in there was
10 to 12 feet of water in the coast. The water
being muddy I could not see if I dived.
After searching some time I heard William Beach
Came. He dived several times and was
unable to find the body. He then took the
hook. After feeling with the hook, he
discovered what he thought was the body.
I placed a pole at the place where we
thought the body to be. He then dove down
by the pole and brought up the body.
The body was quite dead and cold.
I viewed the body and I identified it
as the body of Walt-Lewis Beach.
