Dear Sir,

"Proposed Calliope Valley Railway"

I beg to ask your consideration of the following particulars and trust after perusal you will be able to arrange to visit the District, should you do this I will be glad to convey you over the country so that you may be able to verify my statements as I understand from our local Member, Mr. Kessell, that you prefer to form an idea of a locality yourself before you authorise a survey.

In the country which would be served by the Railway there is at least 150,000 acres of land very suitable for dairying; a large part of it has frontage to the Calliope River, a never-failing fresh water river, and the balance is exceptionally well watered. There is also a large quantity of firstclass agricultural land in this country which would allow of a full supply of fodder being grown for all dairying requirements. The exhibits in the Agricultural Show at Gladstone this year, which came from the Calliope River, prove this district as an agricultural centre. This country is not so subject to drought as country further inland and last year when Queensland was threatened with a drought this country

Hon. Minister for Rlways.

was in good condition as will be seen by my dairy returns.

At present I have four dairies working on the share system and employ 50 hands. I hope to establish further dairies if the Railway is built. One of my neighbours, Mr. E. J. Farmer, of "Hazeldean" has lately commenced a dairy and has purchased 100 cows.

In addition to the dairying and farming this line would be used for trucking cattle.

The timber trade would also expand and this alone should be a good source of revenue as there is some excellent timber in the vicinity.

I do not personally know much of the mining possibilities of the District but I understand from reliable sources they are considerable.

The proposed line would be along level country with only two creeks to bridge and should, I consider, be an easily constructed and not expensive line.

I am directed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government of this Colony to inform you that one James Widdup of Roy Street, Anchor Flower, Brisbane, was recently given an advance of Rs 25/- by this Government for his return passage to Australia. 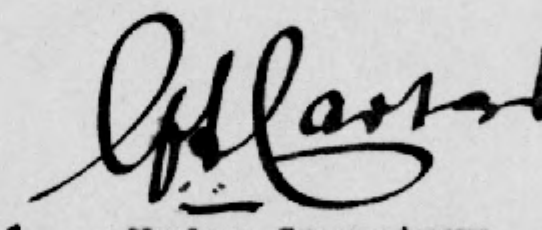

The following Acts should be sent to the Royal Consular
Agent for Italy:-

1. Medical Act of 1867. (Revised Statutes. Vol. 11, p. 2108.)
2. By virtue of Section 6 of this Act, persons registered under the Medical Act 1858, (Imperial), 21 and 22 Vic. c. 90, may practise their profession in Queensland under certain circumstances. This Act ought therefore to be supplied.
3. Similarly - The Medical Act of 1859, 22 Vic. c. 21, (Imperial.)
4. The Medical Act 1886 (49 and 50 Vic. c. 48) also applies to Queensland. Section 6 provides that a Registered Medical Practitioner shall ... be entitled to practise medicine, surgery and midwifery in the United Kingdom and (subject to any local law) in any other part of His Majesty's Dominions.
5. There is also a Medical Act (1886) Amendment Act 1905.

The Imperial Acts before mentioned are printed in the Revised Statutes Vol. 5, pages 4680 to 4693, and copies of the Statutes in this form should be sent.

CHRIST THE CENTRE.

It is profoundly interesting to watch the great variety and diversity of the people who came into contact with Christ in the days of His flesh and His attitude towards each one of them. It is continuously clear that He is the rallying point for people of every class and for every type of character. He gathers all kinds of people about Him, and by being brought face to face with Him they are, sometimes to their own amazement, brought face to face with each other. He will never be the Lord and Saviour of a class, but of the whole race, which embraces every class. People who will entertain Jesus must allow Him to bring His own company, and to them it will often be strange company indeed. People who would naturally shock you, you will have to learn to tolerate and to love, and to see attractiveness in, if you will be a true friend of Jesus. He who laid aside His glory and thought nothing of personal dignity or honour in order that the lowly and poor might be served and won, may reasonably expect something of the same sacrifice from His followers. Pride of position, or of wealth, or of culture, must be put away; social distinctions and caste must be abolished in His presence; scorn of any and all self-righteousness must be crucified with Christ. The rich and the poor, the honoured and the despised, the pure and the defiled, the respectable and the disreputable, must meet in His presence and learn to sit together with all their wide diversity at His feet.

OUR FIRST SERVICE AT THE AUDITORIUM.

More than two thousand five hundred worshippers expectantly crowded into this building on Sunday evening, June 15, and more people than have been usually shut out of the church had to be refused admittance here also. The occasion was a memorable one, for there was the novelty of the most handsomely fitted audience hall in Australasia being used for a reverent solemn church service. Also that the Baptists had earnestly grasped this first opportunity of going outside their own borders, and were prepared to give money, energy, and personal attention to preaching the Gospel to non-churchgoers upon neutral ground. In this is the proof that the young life of the Church may be relied upon to help such a movement; more than thirty young men acted as ushers, and upwards of one hundred men and women formed a supplementary choir. The congregational singing was in admirable volume and time, the free service sheets helping greatly in this. One solo and anthem were finely rendered. In the very heart of the city, this meeting was the most pronounced denial that has ever been struck that Melbourne is indifferent to the Gospel. It is evident that people desire to come under a ministry, where God's grace and love are earnestly and thoughtfully presented, and stirring in them is the hope that the preachers' message will give to them the help they need. The attentive stillness of that great company on Sunday night made this motive impressive; there was not a movement during the forty minutes' sermon; then, with a deep sigh, when the preacher finished, the powerful strain of attention was relaxed, and the service regretfully ended. The text, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ," bore immediate fruit by some declaring their faith, as they had not done before this service. The arrangements worked smoothly, which fact, considering the magnitude of the gathering and the newness of the workers, calls forth our congratulations to the officers in charge.
